The Magic of Museums

The days of museums being unwelcoming, quiet, musty old places with objects half hidden in dark cases are long gone. In recent years, museums have been transformed into family friendly venues with all sorts of exciting things going on for kids. Dea Birkett, Director of the charity Kids in Museums tells us how a bad experience in a museum led her to set up the charity.

It's true. Big trees do from small acorns grow. My small son River was thrown out of an exhibition for shouting "Monster!" at a statue of Eagle Man in the Aztec exhibition at the Royal Academy in London. Eagle Man did look rather like - well - a monster. When I wrote about the incident in my Travelling with Kids column, I thought I was just documenting an unfortunate family outing gone wrong. I never imagined the charity Kids in Museums would start and that now, ten years later, it would be a voice for families who want museums to welcome them, just like mine.

But the response to my column was overwhelming. Hundreds of families wrote to me to say that they were fed up with being treated like pariahs in our museums and galleries. Many weeks later, the Royal Academy got in touch, not to say sorry, but to assure me that they "actively encouraged" families to attend. There was clearly a conflict. While the vast majority of museums now have a policy encouraging us to take part, families were reporting that the day-to-day practice was often different. So Kids in Museums was born, its aim to enable all of us, of whatever age, to feel welcome.

There are those who will disagree with the campaign's premise; museums, they said, were descending into interactive kindergartens, and a stand had to be made for grown-up-only space. "Is there no place sacred?" asked one reader. The assumption was that two year olds can't appreciate art. But River was thrown out of the Aztecs precisely because he was appreciating the exhibition. Even if his comment was loud, it was entirely appropriate. He was not shouting "Noddy!" or making Thomas the Tank Engine noises. He was shouting, "Monster!" at a statue that looked like a monster.

If you haven't taken your family to a museum for a while, you ought to plan to go as soon as possible. It's clear that museums are important to children - that's why it's so important to get it right. And children are equally important to museums; a major factor in adults deciding whether to visit a museum is if they think their kids will enjoy it.

Admittedly, once they were unwelcoming musty old buildings with a few crumbling objects sitting in a glass case. The only information would be a small browning label dwarfed by a large sign: "Don't touch." But museums are changing. (Of course, I'm convinced Kids in Museums is behind this change.) They have family events and workshops; art carts; family trails; computer interactives; Saturday clubs; backpacks stuffed with jigsaws and puzzles to help you explore the galleries; cafes with children's menus; websites to help you prepare for your visit and make it live on after you've left. Most museums are no longer boring and irrelevant, but fun.

If I had to give one tip to parents going to a museum it would be not to leave the gift shop to last. Go there at the beginning of your visit and let your child pick out their very favourite postcard. It shouldn't cost too much. Then go on a hunt for it in the museum; your child will be spurred on to find it, as they chose it themselves. It's letting them design their own very simple trail. And it will stop them spending the whole visit tugging on your sleeve and

asking, 'When can I go to the shop?' For more information about Kids in



Museum of Power

The Museum of Power is housed in a former water pumping station at Langford near Maldon. It is set in attractive riverside grounds and features a gigantic pumping engine which is in steam at some events. The exhibits and interactive displays illustrating the themes of Power and the Story of Water will fascinate all ages. There is an attractive tearoom offering a range of delicious food. School visits are welcome and parties can be catered for. The museum opens at 10am from Wednesday to Sunday between February and December. Museum admission is £4.50 for adults,



£4 for seniors and £2 for children. The miniature steam railway and Model Village operate at most events. Visit www.museumofpower.org.uk for further details.



Coalhouse Fort

The Coalhouse Fort Project is a charity operated solely by volunteers. Its purpose is to preserve and maintain the important Victorian Casemate Fort. Built between 1861 and 1874 to defend London from Napoleon III, it was subsequently occupied by the Army and Navy until vacated in 1962

when it then passed to Thurrock Council. The fort is open to the public every last Sunday of the month and Bank Holidays from March to November with special themed days. There are two museums covering crashed aircraft and fort military history. A number of military vehicles and guns are on display too with a memorial garden to visit. Colchester Museums

History comes alive at Colchester Museums this spring, through a unique mix of the latest technology and hands on activities for your family to discover. Colchester Castle has wowed thousands of happy families with exciting new displays since it reopened its doors following a £4.3m revamp last year. You can explore some amazing archaeological finds, including the 3,000 year old Sheepen Cauldron and the tombstone of Roman centurion Marcus Facilis. These are complemented by a range of hands-on activities like virtual Roman Circus chariot racing and digital app reconstructions of the Castle.

Chelmsford Museum

Chelmsford Museum offers a warm welcome to families with free admission and parking (up to 3 hours), I-Spy quizzes and loan of explorer kits to make the most of your visit. Set in lovely Oaklands Park, the museum tells the story of Chelmsford and includes the Essex Regiment Museum. All areas are accessible for buggies, there are toilets with baby change facilities, outdoor picnic tables and an indoor refreshment room.

There is a varied family activity programme with monthly pre-school 'Friday Fives' group, to school sessions and family workshops where people can work together on a small project. On Wednesday 27th May the half term workshops have a World War 1 theme - a chance


